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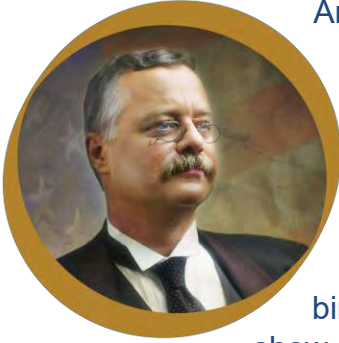
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Premier Evening Lectures at PC

Friday October 17

The Teddy Roosevelt Show



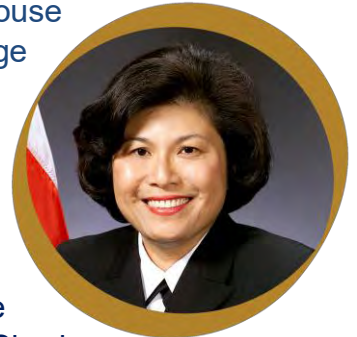
Arizona owes much to President Theodore Roosevelt, who authorized the Roosevelt Dam on the Salt River in 1902, setting the course for Arizona's subsequent growth. The first Premier Lecture of the year is about the "carry a big stick" president, presented as a one-man show by **Joe Wiegand**.

Joe's T.R. shares stories full of adventure, laughter and inspiration as he recounts Roosevelt's adventures as rancher, Rough Rider and president. In 2008, Joe traveled across America in celebration of Teddy Roosevelt's 150th birthday and the centennial year of the end of his presidency, performing this show at the White House and at T.R.'s birthplace in New York City. **\$15**

Friday, November 7

Doctor to Three Presidents

Dr. Connie Mariano was the first military woman to become White House physician to the president, serving George H.W. Bush, Bill Clinton and George W. Bush. She was also the first woman director of the White House Medical Unit and the first Filipino American to become a Navy Rear Admiral. She earned her medical degree from the Uniformed Services University of Medicine, graduating as a Lieutenant in 1981.



After retiring from the Navy in 2001, Dr. Mariano joined the Mayo Clinic in Scottsdale and four years later founded the Center for Executive Medicine in North Scottsdale, a practice designed for executives and their families. She is currently working on a book, **Presidential Secrets to Longevity**. **\$10**

Riders on the Orphan Train



Few people today know much about the largest child migration in U.S. history. The Orphan Train, now the subject of a best-selling novel by Christina Baker Kline, brought 250,000 orphans and unwanted children from New York City to the West. From 1854 to 1930, the children were given away at train stations across America with the hope they would find new opportunities and families in the developing Midwest.

Alison Moore and Phil Lancaster use original songs, storytelling and video interviews with surviving riders to tell the story of this little-known chapter in American history. The show, a program of the National Orphan Train Complex Museum and Research Center, has sold out in performances from Arkansas to Arizona. **\$15**

The Scottsdale Chorus

The **Scottsdale Chorus**, 100-members strong, is bringing its unique blend of four-part harmony a cappella music and dance to PebbleCreek.

As stated on the Scottsdale Chorus Facebook page, "...we are thankful for this 'hobby' that not only allows us to explore the boundaries of beautiful music, but also brings us enrichment on so many other levels by allowing us to make lifelong friendships, to build skills in so many areas, and to participate in things we probably never imagined."



Affiliated with the Sweet Adelines International organization, this championship chorus celebrated its 50th Anniversary in 2012 and has competed in 16 international contests since 1974, never achieving less than third place. Their competitive spirit and commitment to musical excellence has led them to the coveted First Place International Championship four times: 1984, 1989, 2006 and 2011. **\$15**

Sergei Khrushchev & The Cold War From the Other Side



Remember what you learned from your family, teachers, government and the media about the Cold War, when it seemed the Soviet Union was bent on the destruction of our way of life?

Sergei Khrushchev had a front row seat to the inner workings of the Soviet government during the Cold War, not only as the son of Prime Minister Nikita Khrushchev, but also as a Ph.D. scientist working on the Soviet missile and space program. He also worked on the cruise missiles for submarines and military research spacecraft.

Khrushchev and his wife left the Soviet Union in 1991 and became naturalized citizens of the United States in 1999. He is a senior fellow at the Watson Institute for International Studies at Brown University and teaches at the Navy War College in Newport, RI. **\$15**

What's New in Cancer Research?

Erkut Borazanci, M.D., is a drug development scholar at the Virginia G. Piper Cancer Center of Scottsdale Health Center.

As a member of the clinical trials team, he is currently working on developing new therapies for cancer, particularly those involving the pancreas and other gastrointestinal malignancies. He is part of a team that has developed more than 200 new antineoplastic and biologic agents that have been approved for cancer treatment in the United States.



Dr. Borazanci is a key player in the Translational Genomics Research Institute (TGen), which is headquartered in Phoenix and partners with several research partners. TGen employs innovative advances arising from the Human Genome Project to develop earlier diagnostics and smarter treatments. He completed his oncology fellowship training at Louisiana State University Health Science Center in Shreveport. **\$10**

October 20

The Wildlife World Zoo's Story

Mickey Olson, who founded the Wildlife World Zoo and Aquarium 30 years ago, says the zoo began as a breeding farm, a natural outgrowth of his high school interest in breeding birds. The zoo has grown from its original 30 acres to 120 acres.

Located just a few miles away on Northern Avenue, the zoo is a favorite place to take grandkids when they visit PebbleCreek. Come to this lecture and you will get an inside look at how the zoo operates and what the "sure winners" are.



October 27

Surviving the Holocaust in Siberia

Last fall, **Dr. Alexander White** held the audience spellbound as he recounted his experiences as a Holocaust survivor. This year, he will return to tell us the story of Pearl Minz and her family, neighbors of the Whites in Krosno, Poland. The Minz family had gone to Eastern Poland when the Nazis invaded, but were rounded up and sent deep into Northeastern Siberia. Pearl wrote her diary on scraps of paper, which she brought back to Poland after the war. White translated Pearl's diary from Polish to English and uses the story to teach about the Holocaust.



November 3

The American Frontier: Fact or Fiction?

At the age of 11, **Bob Boze Bell** began wondering if the tales he was hearing about the cowboys and Indians, lawmen and villains of the early West were true as presented on TV, in the movies and in comic books. Forty-two years later, he purchased **True West Magazine** and currently serves as its executive editor. In addition to relating the true stories of the Wild West, the magazine links the past to the current Western lifestyle.



November 10

The Sleep Doctor

A clinical psychologist and a widely recognized leader in the ever-evolving field of sleep studies, **Michael Breus, PhD**, specializes in sleep disorders, appears regularly on radio and TV, and is a well-known speaker to both professional and public groups. He is the author of three books on the benefits of sleeping well including the bestseller, **Good Night: The Sleep Doctor's 4-Week Program to Better Sleep and Better Health**.





November 17

The FBI on International Terrorism



Two **Supervisory Special Agents** from the Phoenix Division of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, with expertise in international terrorism, will tell us—as much as they can without revealing FBI secrets—what is being done to head off such attacks.

The FBI's work locally is supplemented by the Phoenix Joint Terrorism Task Force, which runs down all terrorism leads, investigates cases and proactively identifies threats that may impact the area and the nation. LifeLong Learning cannot publish the names or photos of the Special Agents who will be at the lecture, but it promises to be one of the highlights of the season.

January 12

Breakthroughs in Alzheimer's Research

Every 67 seconds someone in the United States develops Alzheimer's disease. While much research in the past two decades has focused on the treatment of Alzheimer's, the focus has recently turned to the early detection of brain changes before symptoms appear, and the Banner Alzheimer's Institute is internationally known for these efforts. **Dr. Eric Reiman**, chief executive officer of Banner Research and executive director of Banner Alzheimer's Institute, will bring news of the latest discoveries to PebbleCreek.



January 19

January 26

Commercial Drones in the AZ Skies



The range of civilian applications for very small flying vehicles is truly breath taking. These small helicopters and airplanes can survey crops for pests, fight forest fires, provide event security, search for lost children in the wilderness, photograph remote geography, and maybe someday even deliver packages for Amazon, among many other civilian applications. **Lt. General John Regni, USAF, Retired**, is dedicated to launching commercial unmanned aerospace vehicles, commonly called civil drones or UAVs, into Arizona skies.

February 2

Evolutionary Medicine

For a group of physicians, the question is not **how** we get sick, but **why** we do. These physicians are practitioners of evolutionary medicine, or Darwinian medicine, which seeks to find out how we've become susceptible to diseases, such as antibiotic resistance.

Professor Randolph M. Nesse, M.D. is the founding director of the ASU Center for Evolution & Medicine. He is noted for his research on the origins of emotions and how natural selection shapes the capacity for mood.





February 9

The Story of Pancho Villa

Jim Turner, who retired from the Arizona Historical Society in 2009 and is a prolific writer and lecturer on Arizona and the Southwest, is one of PebbleCreek's most popular lecturers.

In this return trip at 10 a.m. Monday, February 9, he will branch a little further south to bring us tales of Pancho Villa, Mexico's own Robin Hood. He was the charismatic leader of a band of robbers who opposed the brutal rulers of Mexico and who rustled cattle and robbed banks to provide food to the suffering peasantry.

February 16

How We Get Our Water

Last year a small group visited the Central Arizona Project's headquarters in Phoenix for a tour of the facility. They were so impressed with the tour leader, that we are bringing him to PebbleCreek so a larger audience can learn about the water issues facing Phoenix and Arizona.



Larry Person is vice president of The Person Group - Environmental Division. He served as the City of Scottsdale's Senior Environmental Coordinator for almost 18 years, during which time he developed numerous environmental initiatives and programs that brought honor and recognition to the city.

February 23

Carbon Nation: Becoming a More Energy Efficient Country

Peter Byck is the director, producer and writer of **Carbon Nation**, a documentary film about solutions to climate change. He recently joined the faculty of Arizona State University in both the School of Sustainability and the Cronkite School of Journalism.



He believes that liberals and conservatives in the U.S. are not polarized, as the popular press presents. Through Byck's humor, curious mind and respectful approach, he gets to the core of peoples' beliefs – listening carefully for common ground.

March 2

Sex Trafficking, Surviving Life on the Streets

Carolyn Jones began prostituting herself at the age of 15 as a way to survive, and lived that life for 30 years, victimized by sex traffickers. Her sister, also a prostitute, was murdered in 2003 during a crime spree targeting prostitutes. Carolyn began praying for her life to change.

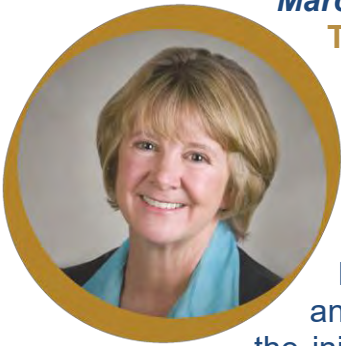


Carolyn now works at **Streetlights USA**, an organization that helps rescue women and young girls from being victims of sex trafficking. She is speaking out on behalf of other victims, in order to help them to become survivors.



March 9

The JonBenet Ramsey Investigation



PebbleCreek's **Mary Lacy** was the Boulder County chief deputy district attorney, sexual assault unit, on Christmas Day 1996, when six-year-old JonBenet was murdered. The body of the child beauty pageant queen was found in the family's basement, about eight hours after she was reported missing.

Lacy will explain why the homicide investigation was doomed from the start and how the crime scene was irrevocably tainted. She will present details about the initial stages of the investigation the Grand Jury process, and share why she took over the investigation from the Boulder Police Department.

March 16

Air Quality in Phoenix

Drive west into the White Tank Mountains and look down into Goodyear and the Valley. The brownish-purple haze that often settles on the Valley floor is the air we breathe, the result of living in an arid landscape, surrounded by farmland and mountains, with a rapid growth in population.

Air Quality Specialists with the Arizona Department of Environmental Quality will tell us how harmful the air is and what is being done to reduce the problems. Founded in 1987, the department is responsible for monitoring, reporting and controlling the air, water and land pollution in our state.



March 23

Preventing Recidivism in Female Inmates



Sue Ellen Allen, an inmate in Perryville from 2002 to 2009 and a very popular lecturer two years ago, and **Martha Mayhood Mertz** (pictured left) founder of ATHENA International, will be here to tell us about the lives of the women inside the prison, what brought them to it, and what can be done to prevent future incarcerations.

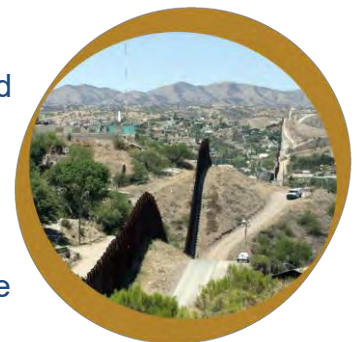
Allen, a University of Texas graduate, former educator, former business owner and former community leader, is the chief visionary for Gina's Team. Named for her prison roommate who died at age 25 while serving time, Gina's Team brings educational programs and speakers into prisons to inspire and empower inmates to strive for a better future and a successful reentry.

March 30

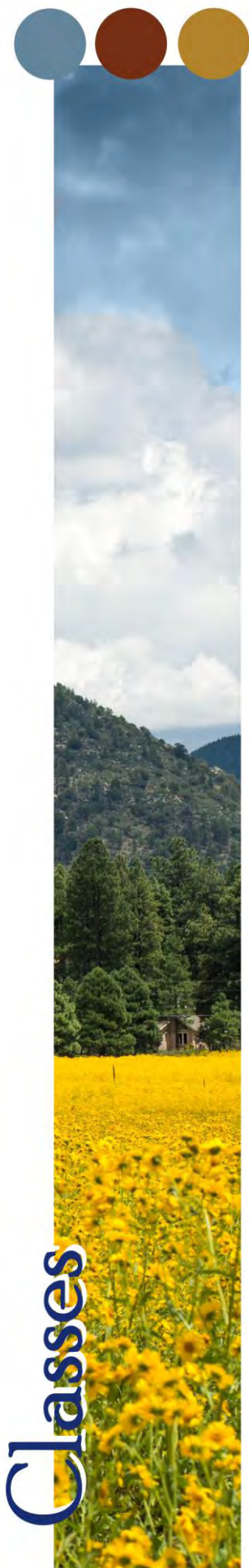
The Border Patrol

Cinema Society of PebbleCreek

Love to go to the movies but despair at the offerings shown in local area theaters? Now you won't have to travel across town to see independent, foreign and other unusual films.

LifeLong Learning and the Activity Office are collaborating to bring a new program to the community: **The Cinema Society of PebbleCreek**. Once a month, November-April, members of the Cinema Society will be able to see a film and join in a discussion led by Andrew Friedenber, who started a Cinema Society in San Diego 31 years ago and recently expanded to Las Vegas, Scottsdale and Surprise.

A typical Cinema Society program includes a formal introduction, the screening of a feature film premiere, classic, documentary and/or short subject, followed by a cinema chat and discussion. The events typically include a guest speaker: a critic or occasionally an actor, director or studio representative involved with the film's production. Speakers share their expertise, providing a forum to discuss various aspects of the movie.

Many of the films will have been shown in film festivals; some will be movies that have not yet been released. Titles of the films are shared with the members via email before the screening date. The Cinema Society will meet in the Renaissance Theater from 10 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. on the following Thursdays: November 6, December 4, January 29, February 12, March 12 and April 9. Season Membership is \$95 and tickets to individual screenings are transferrable.
